What have you done to change the world through reading?

“It’s good to have a pile of books, but be careful of how attached you are to them. Books only make sense when they go around and people read them. A book stuck on a shelf doesn’t transmit knowledge. Read the books on your bookshelf. Give them to other people when you finish reading them.” Bibliotecas do Brasil.

Two collective movements in Brazil, Imagina na Copa and Simplicidades, got together in a project that is very simple: people should choose a book that was important to them, write a short message, print it on a bookmark and leave it in a public place. With this gesture, they hope to improve the quality of both urban relationships and life in the cities.

The movement Estante Pública, in Porto Alegre, assembles bookshelves in bus stops and people bring books and leave them there so everyone can take them for free.

Little Free Library encourages reading and raising the sense of community. Little libraries in the shape of small houses have spread through 17 countries and have more than 2,000 units. Their plan is taking 2,500 books to Africa.

Cooperifa (Cooperativa Cultural da Periferia) is one of the most active movements in São Paulo. They promote public readings called *saraus* and there are weekly meetings with readings, movies and documentaries produced by artists from the suburbs. They received the Educador Inovador award from Unesco.

In Kenya, camels have been used to take books to schools located in remote areas in the northeast of the country.

There are several movements around the world whose aim is to build a more democratic reality starting with books. They can really change the world!
