Speaking Procedure

1. Greet the student. Invite him/her to sit down. Have a brief conversation as a warm-up.

Example dialogue

T: Hello. My name's _____. What's your name?

S: (My name's) _____.

T: How old are you?

S: (I'm) _____ (years old).

2. Display the two pictures and say, "Look at these pictures of a beach." Then ask, "What can you see in the pictures?" Encourage the student to name characters, nature and trash. If needed, point to an object and ask, "What is it?" or "Who is he/she?" Alternatively, ask the student to point to an object mentioned: "Point to (the cardboard box)."

3. Ask questions to compare the pictures. For example, "Which beach is (dirtier)?" Use the following comparative adjectives: nicer, cleaner, dirtier, more polluted, more beautiful.

Example dialogue

T [SHOWING BOTH PICTURES]: Which beach is dirtier: beach A or beach B?

S [POINTS TO BEACH B]: Beach B (is dirtier). / This one.

4. Ask questions about the number of things on each beach: "How many (plastic bottles) can you see on beach B?" Continue with plastic bags, recycling bins, cans, banana peels.

Speaking Score Guide

Score 1 point for items named in the pictures.

Score 1 point for identifying the correct picture in step 3 and giving a phrase or sentence.

Score 1 point for pointing to or saying the correct number of items in step 4.

Very good (+)

Can name at least 4 items, identify the right picture at least 4 times, and say at least 4 correct number of items.

Satisfactory (✓)

Can name at least 3 items, identify the right picture at least 3 times, and say at least 3 correct number of items.

Needs additional support (-)

Cannot name more than 2 items, cannot identify the right picture more than twice, and cannot say more than 2 correct number of items.
